



Our doors opened for visitors at 10:00 with Jon Pearson, Judith Smith, and Judy DeNegris greeting everyone who was lured by the church's beauty and organ music. By afternoon Dot Dever, Rick Forshaw, Louisa Carr, and Chris Henry were also welcoming the 420+ visitors who came in. The most common question: "How old is the church?"

Gerald, as always, was out with Kevin at dawn to set up the equipment, tables and chairs for St. George's Café. Artists start their day early and so does our lunch line, so the grills and hot fryer heated up about 10:30 with Jim Wingate, Gene DeLong, and James Whitehead cooking, and Ann Duff, Judy DeLong, and Nancy Angus taking orders and serving hot food. Johnny Angus dealt with cold drinks while Marilyn Warner and Joan Bessarab collected money. Sandee Hughes and Joan Pearson filled in everyplace while Kevin Grace ran the kitchen. Jim Moore, Sam Wengrovius, Steve and Sue Hartz, and Sue Jenner arrived to work when the lines were longest, and Paul Smigelski finished the day on the grill. A separate table selling hot and cold drinks was a popular addition, manned throughout the day by Kevin's niece, Amelia, and her friend Cassidy. Jeff Wengrovius stayed after playing his recital to help with the quickest cleanup ever.

Andrew once again organized the popular organ recitals that started at 10:30. Visitors heard Jeff

Wengrovius, Andrew Krystopolski, Justan Foster of First Reformed Church in Scotia, Joan Pearson, Trevor Kahlbaugh of First Presbyterian Church in Albany, and Derek Stannard of Immaculate Conception in Glenville. The church was alive with music and conversation and photographers.

OUTREACH



Schenectady Inner City Ministry (SICM)

The Schenectady Inner city Ministry is an ecumenical partnership, founded in 1967, of 54 congregations (encompassing 15 denominations) for ministries of social service and social justice. SICM's stated mission is to minister to the urban community and its individuals; to challenge religious organizations, individual members and the general

community to provide greater involvement and service in the urban community; and to develop understanding, trust, and cooperation among religious organizations and encourage their membership in the organization.

SICM operates the largest emergency food organization in Schenectady County, the Schenectady Damien Center (a drop-in resource center for people infected with or affected by HIV/AIDS), the Summer Lunch program, and wellness initiatives. The SICM food pantry is located at 839 Albany Street and serves any Schenectady County resident in need of food. ID is required to prove residence and the pantry can be accessed one time per month. It is open M,W,Th,F from 9 to 11:30. In 2014 the pantry served 50,119 individuals.

St George's is a founding member of SICM and has supported many of the programs it operates especially the food pantry and the summer lunch program. Georgians have helped serve lunches in previous years and can be proud of Erin Thiessen's fine efforts as St George's intern the last two summers, in her contribution to SICM's summer activities.

Because caring for our neighbors is so fundamental to our Christian faith, St. George's has an on-going collection of non-perishable foodstuffs for the food pantry, with an informal goal of supporting the food pantries efforts at a 1,000 pound per year donation. There is a basket in the parish hall awaiting your contributions. 569 pounds of food have been turned in so far in 2015. Please make it a part of your Sunday morning routine to grab a couple of cans from your pantry to drop in the basket on your way to coffee hour!

SICM is always in need of volunteers to help sustain its programs.

us to name someone in the prayers, and quite a few have regular requests."



THE ASSOCATION OF ANGLICAN MUSICIANS 2015 CONFERENCE

"The tree of life my soul hath seen
Laden with fruit and always green
The trees of nature fruitless be
Compared with Christ the apple tree" Jane Siberry



Over 300 musicians, liturgists, and enthusiasts from all over the country gathered in Tampa on June 14-18 for the Annual Conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians. The conference theme, "The Tree of Life My Soul Hath Seen," was a reminder that our salvation history is even more than a living, breathing story: it is a dynamic cycle that recurs in every Christian in every age. As church musicians, we have been entrusted with the awesome privilege of bringing the drama and urgency of this story to life in every liturgy we shape at St. George's. These few days of conference allowed us to put that privilege into perspective and gave us the opportunity to reflect on how we as Georgians encounter "Jesus Christ, the Apple Tree."

Our central location at the Hilton, Downtown Tampa, allowed us to walk to many of the conference sites. The opening Eucharist Monday morning at St. Andrew's Church welcomed us with a tremendous organist, wonderful choir, and stunning congregational singing. Members of AAM arrived for rest, recharging, and sharing: church organist can be a lonely profession.

Morning Prayer, Evensong, or Eucharist, each day meant a meticulously planned service at another Episcopal church. Two of these were especially memorable. Monday afternoon in Sykes Chapel (at the University of Tampa) we participated in a workshop on Contemplative Evensong with Charles Hogan of St. Mary's Church in High Point, NC. We remember a typical Florida thunder storm beginning as the entire chapel was in silent meditation before Evensong. The service was sung a capella by conference attendees so there was no organ prelude. The great storm was our accompaniment for Evensong. We could hear rain crashing on the chapel roof and thunder echoing through the large hall. Psalm 77 was appointed and verses 16 & 17 couldn't have been timed more perfectly with the elements. It was a holy moment for us.

Another amazing musical prayer occurred the next morning. On Tuesday we boarded buses to St. Thomas Church, Snell Island, St. Petersburg, for Sung Morning Prayer. The Reverend Canon Dr. Thomas Williams was the preacher and the Gulf Coast Youth Chorus sang the Canticles. The best part of the whole service for us: the congregation of about 300 singing 40 verses of Psalm 78 in four part harmony, alternating between decani and cantoris, incorporating dynamics and prayer. It was an awesome experience. The Service concluded with a hymn commissioned for our conference by Rev. John L. Hooker on the text, "The Tree of Life My Soul Hath Seen." At an AAM conference music is worship, and the singing fortissimo.

We heard unbelievable recitals, one by Dr. Haig Mardirosian, a Dean of the University, on the Dobson organ in Sykes Chapel; and another from Joshua Stafford, Director of Music at St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Morristown, NJ, on the Reuter organ in the First Presbyterian Church, St. Petersburg.

On Wednesday morning, we were given the kind invitation to come and play the organ at Sykes Chapel thanks to our friend, Maury Castro (formerly of First United Pres. in Troy). Since Maury's church on Cape Cod is in the market for a new pipe organ, he had arranged a special meeting with the builder of the



chapel's organ to learn more about an instrument for his church. We were the only three people in the entire conference given an all access pass for a few hours on this remarkable instrument. There is video of Andrew playing this instrument on YouTube.

We attended a workshop on Keeping the Singer's Voice Healthy given by Dr. Daniel Vincent, a Tampa Bay ENT, which included a video of vibrating vocal cords and photos of vocal nodes and hemorrhages. Another workshop, Copyright Law and the Church Musician, given by lawyer and church musician Jason Lorenzon, spoke about the nitty-gritty of copyright laws. Many churches break copyright laws and don't even realize it. We are proud to say that St. George's Church abides by all copyright laws. There was an anthem-reading session, sight-singing new music from composers and publishers.

The Dali Museum, trolley ride, flamenco dancers, talented teen voices – all added to the mix. We returned with music, ideas for music, and fresh oxygen. Music and God are both infinite. It seems natural that we help them come together in worship.

The Apostles' Creed

Several years ago, we reviewed the history of something familiar - The Nicene Creed. Said at every Mass, the Nicene Creed is a testament of our faith, the foundation of the Church and something we probably all know by heart. But the Church also uses the Apostles' Creed and occasionally the Athanasian Creed. Today, we review the Apostles' Creed which, together with the Nicene Creed, is commonly used in worship. In traditional language:

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth;

And in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord,

who was conceived by the Holy Ghost,

born of the Virgin Mary,

suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, dead, and buried.

He descended into hell.

The third day he rose again from the dead,

He ascended into heaven,

and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty;

From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Ghost;

the holy catholic Church,

the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins;

the resurrection of the body,

and the life everlasting. Amen.

BCP Catechism, p. 851: "The Creeds are statements of our basic beliefs about God." - "The Apostles' Creed is the ancient creed of Baptism; it is used in the Church's daily worship to recall our Baptismal Covenant." – "The Nicene Creed is the creed of the universal Church and is used at the Eucharist."



The rubic above this 13thcentury illuminated manuscript translates "twelve articles of faith set out by twelve apostles".

<u>Origins</u> The Apostles' Creed was not written by the apostles. It was written at least 150 years after the apostles had all died and became known as the Apostles' Creed because it was thought to be a record of what the apostles taught - that under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, each of the Twelve Apostles contributed an article of a creed. The first mention of an "Apostles' Creed" occurs in a letter of 390 from a synod in Milan to <u>Pope Siricius</u>: "Let them give credit to the Creed of the Apostles, which the Roman Church has always kept and preserved undefiled".

But what existed then was not what we know as the Apostles' Creed. It was shorter, evolved from simpler texts based on various New Testament phrases and has been argued that it was already in written form by the late 2^{nd}

century. It did not include the 7th century phrase "maker of heaven and earth", nor the phrase "he descended into hell", nor "the communion of saints" (i.e., what each one of us has in common with all other believers).

Because of its original form, the Apostles' Creed does not address some Christological issues as do the Nicene and other creeds. For example, it says nothing about the divinity of Jesus or of the Holy Spirit. Nor does it address theological questions that became objects of dispute centuries later.

Apostles' Creed Today

The Apostles' Creed is widely used by a number of Christian denominations for both liturgical and catechetical purposes, notably by Roman Catholics, Anglicans and Lutherans, but also by Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists.

The Episcopal Church uses the Apostles' Creed as a Baptismal Covenant. Following a series of questions to the candidates or their sponsors, the Apostles' Creed is then recited by candidates, sponsors and congregation, each section of the Creed being an answer to the celebrant's question, beginning with "Do you believe in God the Father (God the Son, God the Holy Spirit)?" The Apostles' Creed is also proclaimed in church twice daily – at Morning and Evening Prayer.

We will always have questions, but in the two foundational statements of faith – the Apostles' Creed used at baptism, and the Nicene Creed used at communion – we join Christians throughout the ages in affirming our faith in the one God who created us, redeemed us, and sanctifies us.





- TREASURER'S REPORT -

As we enter the final stretch of 2015, St. George's finances are looking okay. Our pledge income is slightly over our budget as of the end of August. By year-end it will probably be very close to budget. That is not to suggest that pledge income has been high this year: our 2015 budget anticipated a falloff in giving of approximately 12% from what we received in 2014.

Our spending has been restrained this year because we haven't had to cover the salary of a full-time rector. A full-time rector would also have been likely to bring in outside speakers with related expenses that we have not incurred. Of course, the savings from not having a rector is a double-edged sword. Having a full-time rector is likely to raise giving levels as everyone feels better about the future, so you will never hear me say that I like saving money during a period without a rector.

Please keep up your pledges. We did budget for a \$3,289 deficit this year. It will help our recruiting efforts if we can tell prospective candidates that we anticipate a surplus, and it won't take much to get us there!
